Indonesia, Mar 24: National Exams Cancelled Amid Covid-19 Pandemic [Jakarta Global].

The Indonesian government has decided to cancel the 2020 national exams at all levels – elementary, junior high and senior high school – to help curb the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic. <u>LINK</u>
