## **ASIA & PACIFIC**

Australia, 5 Feb [The Guardian]: Coronavirus: more than 4,000 students sign petition to delay start of university. More than 4,000 international students have signed a petition to delay the start of the university semester due to the government's ongoing travel ban on people travelling through China. Classes at a range of Australian universities are due to start in February, despite the government's announcement that any foreign nationals who have travelled through China since 1 February will be banned from entering Australia for 14 days. LINK

Australia, 5 Feb [School-news]: Bushfire education is too abstract. We need to get children into the real world. Many children – like 11-year-old Finn who drove a boat with his mother, brother and dog on board to safety – have been directly involved in the emergency response. Vast numbers of tourists have also been affected, many of them children. This shows how essential it is for all children and young people, regardless of their geographic location in Australia, to have appropriate education about bushfire prevention, mitigation, preparedness and response. Malaysia, 2 Feb [The Star]: Magnifying Malaysians. A social media project promoting science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM), is gaining momentum. Dubbed '100 Scientists of Malaysia', or 100 SoM, the project by three UK-based PhD researchers aims to highlight 100 local individuals who are working in STEM. Launched on Aug 31 last year, 100 SoM was founded by University of Nottingham's Anthony Beh, Josh Khoo and Sara Wong, to increase visibility of Malaysian scientists, showcase diversity of STEM, and inspire the pursuit of those subjects among students here. New Zealand, 4 Feb [Education.govt.nz]: Schools to hold local vocational careers and pathway events. The events will be held across the schooling period between term 1 2020 and term 2 of 2021. A funding round was established in 2019 for kura, state and state-integrated schools, and kāhui ako to run vocational education events. This funding is part of a comprehensive plan to strengthen vocational education and address skills gap. LINK

Philippines, 5 Feb [Inquirer]: DepEd orders schools to avoid 'crowding' of students. Avoid "crowding" of students. This was the directive of the Department of Education (DepEd) in Eastern Visayas amid the scare of the 2019 novel coronavirus (2019-nCov). DepEd Regional Director Ramir Uytico said the holding of the flag raising ceremonies should now be held inside classrooms instead of the regular venue, which is at the school grounds. LINK

Philippines, 4 Feb [The Rappler]: House passes bill requiring GMRC subject from Kinder to Grade 3. Law-makers want to make it mandatory for students from Kindergarten to Grade 3 in all public and private schools to take a Good Manners and Right Conduct (GMRC) subject. On Tuesday, February 4, the House of Representatives approved on 3rd and final reading House Bill (HB) No. 5829 or the "Good Manners and Right Conduct Act" with a vote of 225-0-0. LINK

Singapore, 4 Feb [Straits Times]: SMU wants students to 'interrupt' studies. When the Singapore Management University (SMU) was set up in 2000, it was the upstart in the higher education landscape. Unlike the National University of Singapore and Nanyang Technological University, which admitted students based on examination results, SMU used a broad range of criteria, including interviews and reflective essays to select students. South Korea, 3 Feb [Inquirer]: Coronavirus shuts down nearly 340 schools in South Korea. According to the Ministry of Education, 245 kindergartens, 53 elementary schools, 21 middle schools, 16 high schools and one special-education school postponed reopening following the month-long winter vacation or halted operations to rein in the spread of the coronavirus. Germany, 4 Feb [The Jakarta Post]: German court rules against school niqab ban. A court in Germany ruled Monday against an attempt by authorities in Hamburg to forbid a 16-year-old schoolgirl from wearing a niqab during lessons. The ruling, which cannot be appealed, has fuelled debate in Germany over whether schools should allow the niqab, a facial veil worn by Muslims which leaves only the wearer's eyes visible. LINK

United Kingdom, 6 Feb [The Guardian]: Two in five 18-year-olds in UK apply to study at university this year. Two out of every five 18-year-olds in the UK are applying for a place to study at university this year, along with record numbers of students from China and India, according to figures from the university admissions service. Jordan, 5 Feb [MENAFN-Jordan Times]. More than 20 per cent of children in Jordan multidimensionally poor — UNICEF report. Over 20 per cent of children living in the Kingdom are multi-dimensionally poor, while half of its young women are not enrolled in education, according to a recent UN study. The study noted, however, that 'significant progress' has been made over the last decade in healthcare provision and in achieving near gender parity in early education and primary education. LINK

Kenya 5 Feb [The Monitor]: How State Repeatedly Failed School Pupils. "I want to state firmly and categorically; the children of Kenyans are safe in schools." These were the words of Education Cabinet Secretary Prof George Magoha in September 23 last year. Prof Magoha was speaking at Precious Talent Academy in Dagoretti. A classroom building had tumbled, killing eight learners and injuring more than 60 others. LINK

South Africa, 2 Feb: South Africa is getting 9 new college campuses this year – here's where they are being built [Business Tech]. The Department of Higher Education, Science and Technology is building a number of new Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) college campuses as a means of tackling the country's skills shortages. Higher education minister, Blade Nzimande, said that his department is currently targeting 13 priority trades comprising skillsets in bricklaying, electrician, millwright, boilermaker and automotive mechanics, among others.
