Australia, Sep 4: Update - Plan to bring back international students to Australia awaiting PM's approval [Study International]. Australia's pilot programme to bring in 300 international students to South Australia is reportedly days away from being finalised this week. In a statement to SBS Punjabi, a state government spokesperson said they are waiting for the federal government's approval of the proposal. LINK
