SOUTHEAST ASIA

ASEAN, Apr 28 [The ASEAN Post]: Facing A Pandemic With Disabilities. Just last month, it was reported that the partners of General Election Network for Disability Access (AGENDA) from Cambodia, Indonesia, Malaysia, Myanmar, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam and the Philippines held a call to discuss the barriers that citizens with disabilities encounter during the pandemic. Cambodia, Apr 23 [The Phnom Penh Post]: Ministry, JICA app for online learning. Think! Think! is a good learning tool to improve IQ, deep thinking and social skills. Philippine, May 3 [The Philippine Star]: Various learning strategies eyed for basic education. As the threat of a coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) infection is expected to remain even after the quarantine regulations are relaxed, the Department of Education (DepEd) has started to consider various learning strategies that could be adopted once schools are allowed to reopen. Malaysia, Apr 27 [The Star/Asia News Network]: As lessons move online, Malaysian teachers and students struggle with uneven Internet access. Even though the government announced free 1GB data daily through selected telcos for MCO, in the rural areas, there is no access to a stable Internet connection. LINK

The decision to allow these students who were stranded on campus following the imposition of the Movement Control Order (MCO) to travel home was announced following the drop in the number of COVID-19 cases. Businesses in non-essential services would be worst-hit, while the only bright spots in the economy are the health care, education and public administration sectors.
