ASEAN, May 3 [ASEAN Today]: Countries start to ease social distancing restrictions: How they covered it. Vietnam's control of the coronavirus pandemic has been well documented. After reporting no new infections for seven straight days, its government announced the easing of social distancing in almost all areas. Malaysia and Thailand are gradually allowing some businesses to re-open while for other countries, it will be much longer before they can get back to normal. LINK

ASEAN, May 1 [Consultancy.asia]: Deloitte providing coronavirus support for communities in ASEAN and beyond.
