**Jun 30 [BBC News] : More pupils sent home as Covid disruption soars.** There has been a sharp rise in pupils sent home from school in England because of Covid, according to the latest official figures. They showed that more than 375,000 pupils - about one in 20 - were out of school for Covid-related reasons, up by more than 130,000 in a week. Absences have quadrupled during June. LINK



**Jun 29 [BBC News] : School isolation rules could end in autumn.** The Covid control system in England's schools, where groups of pupils have to self-isolate if one tests positive, could be scrapped in the autumn. Ministers are looking at asking secondary schools to introduce daily testing instead.
